Jackson; that their object was, by these means of bargain and corruption, to exclude Mr. Adams from the Department of State, or to secure my promotion to office; and that I was privy and assented to those positions and to the employment of those means.

Such being the accusation and prosecutor, and the issue between us, I have now a right to expect that he will substantiate his charges by the exhibition of satisfactory evidence. In that event, there is no punishment which would exceed the measures of my offence. In the opposite event, what ought to be the judgement of the American public is cheerfully submitted to their wisdom and justice.

## COMMERCIAL.

SAYANNAH JULY 21

**COTTON**—Some few sales of Uplands have taken place during the week at prices from 8 1/2 to 9 and 9 1/2 has been refused for prime. There are but few buyers in consequence of a want of shipping. Sea Islands remain steady at 10 to 11 and for a fine lot 23 has been paid.

**RICE**—The want of vessels tends also to depress this article. The few sales that have been made, were at 24 to 25.

**CORN**—Is selling from the stores at 60 cts. We have not had a cargo sale for several weeks.

**FREIGHTS**—Our port never was so bare of shipping. We have but 1 ship, 3 schrs, and 2 sloops at our wharves. The last freight to Liverpool was 3. Coastwise 1 1/2.
