If we recollect, the origin of Gymnastic Exercises of late years, they were instituted for the purpose of affording an opportunity to the young men of Germany to meet together, interchange patriotic sentiments and vow vengeance against Napoleon.— They were instituted for the use of soldier youths, not children of eight and ten years of age. The exercises consisted in such sports as trained fitted the sinews in war, and at the same time, employed them as nature intended them to be used in natural motions. In America, however, gymnastics are taught in children's schools, and instructors are appointed to superintend a series of exercises which in many instances, are as improper and useless, as they are injurious. Teach boys to ride on horseback, to walk, to run, to swim—all these things are useful.— But, why incur the risk of hernia, diseased spine, consumption, &c. in making them climb ropes, lift weights, balance poles and fifty other things; which, if they leave school with a sound constitution, even, they will never practice afterwards. If a man intends his son for a porter, a sailor, or a merry andrew, there may be some reason for the practice of feats of strength and agility on poles and ropes; but, if he intends him for the law, commerce, medicine, the pulpit, mechanic, &c. why strain uselessly, sinews and muscles which nature, when

"O homo sublime dedit, calumque tueri," never intended should be distorted or increased by unnatural exertion. West Point gave an example, and military schools sent their spruce little Cadets, with their uniforms, in swarms over the country, the pride of parents and the amusement of every one else. We hope that the Gymnastics of the German *Tugendbund* will not be equally imitated in the "Gymnastic Exercises" of our American Colleges.—[*Balt. Gaz.*]
